## Are You "Capturing Water"?

We throw away more 60 million plastic water bottles each day. Most end up in landfills or incinerators but some litter our parks and streets and public spaces. Many of those plastic bottles are tossed with their lids screwed on often with water or liquids still inside. At least 22 million gallons of water/liquid is trapped in plastic bottles and thrown into landfills annually in the US alone. These plastic bottles can take up to one million years to disintegrate. The water inside is CAPTURED WATER and can never be available to use again, EVER. Best for our environment not to use plastic bottles but if we do, recycle them with no liquids left inside, please.

## Support PDA's Response to California Wildfires

**Give** – Please make checks payable to the church and mark 'California Wildfires' in the memo line. **Pray** – God, our refuge and our strength, you are an ever-present help in trouble.

The beginning of this year has brought unprecedented challenges for our neighbors in California, who are now facing a devastating disaster. The harrowing images of wildfires consuming parts of Los Angeles and Ventura counties have deeply impacted us all, stirring our hearts with sorrow and compassion. Authorities are reporting this as a historic and deadly wildfire event. More than 40,000 acres have burned, with over 12,300 structures destroyed, entire communities wiped out, and tens of thousands of residents displaced. Currently, 92,000 residents are under evacuation orders, and 89,000 more remain in evacuation warning zones, meaning they may need to leave their homes at a moment's notice. Tragically, at least 24 lives have been lost, and the numbers continue to rise as fires remain uncontained. This is an ongoing disaster, and the extent of damage and loss continues to evolve, with figures expected to change as the situation develops.

As part of the ongoing response and in consultation with the Presbyteries of the Pacific, San Fernando and San Gabriel, as well as the Synod of Southern California and Hawaii and its leadership, Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) has been in communication with faith leaders in the affected communities. In addition to providing emotional and spiritual care, PDA has already released emergency grants to meet the urgent needs of the communities and to provide immediate assistance. Though the final outcomes of these fires are yet to be known, we are clear that the magnitude of the event will require the development of long-term projects and assistance, both for the physical and emotional long-lasting effects. Presbyterians in the region are participating in coordination calls with nonprofit and faith-based disaster organizations to ensure that no one is forgotten.

PDA affirms our commitment to accompany those affected by this disaster. As people of God, once again we are called to stand with our siblings in the "GAP" – Give, Act and Pray.
